Record washed away

The torrential downpour late Wednesday afternoon that caused a mudslide on U.S. 53 at the Eau Claire-Chippewa county line added nearly 2 inches of rain to what is officially the wettest year on record in Eau Claire.

The National Weather Service confirmed that Eau Claire had received 25.65 inches of precipitation this year as of 7 p.m. Wednesday, eclipsing the previous year-to-date record of 22.08 inches in 1973. The agency's records date back to 1950.

After an exceptionally snowy winter, the precipitation has continued this spring and summer, with a string of recent thunderstorms swelling creeks and rivers.

Snow, spate of T-storms put year in the history books as wettest yet

The 2013 precipitation total is 12.42 inches above normal for this point in the year, said meteorologist Tony Zaleski of the Weather Service office in Chanhassen, Minn. Last year at this time the city had received 15.5 inches of precipitation.

The 1.64 inches of rain recorded Wednesday in Eau Claire caused a mudslide on U.S. 53 between Melby Street and the North Crossing that closed both southbound lanes of the bypass for about 20 minutes, with traffic rerouted to Melby and Business U.S. 53. The passing lane was opened shortly before 6 p.m. after Eau Claire County crews accessed the area and began removing mud from the right lane with end loaders.

The mudslide, which involved two patches of grassy hillside that gave way and oozed over the shoulder and right lane of the highway, was cleaned up and all lanes were opened at about 9 p.m., said Sgt. Mark Provost of the Eau Claire County sheriff's office. The largest patch of land contributing to the mudslide appeared to be about 40-by-80

The storms that struck the Chippewa Valley late Wednesday afternoon also

caused temporary flooding but no known accidents or injuries on many streets in Eau Claire, Altoona and rural parts of Eau Claire County, officials reported. Many low-lying areas of Riverview Park were still underwater at 7 p.m., with one park visitor even spotted taking a dip next to a picnic pavilion.

Eau Claire and Altoona police reported a few manhole covers popped off because of the large amount of water flowing through storm water systems.

Officers temporarily closed a few flooded streets — all for less than half an hour — because storm sewers were unable to keep up with the volume of water, said

Workforce patterns point to growth

The Eau Claire metro workforce grew by 1,800 employees in May compared with the previous month, according to preliminary, seasonally unadjusted data from the state Department of Workforce Development.

Employment in the area, which includes Eau Claire and Chippewa counties, was 300 higher than in May of last year. The jobless rate last month was 5.9 percent, compared with 6.6 percent in April and 5.8 percent in the year-ago period.

"Though the unemployment rate itself was relatively unchanged, the labor force data it's produced from moved in mainly a positive direction," said Scott Hodek, regional DWD economist. "Most of those joining the labor force in May 2013 ended up employed (plus 633), with the number of unemployed only rising by 135.

"Of course it'd be ideal if everyone who wanted a job could find one instantly, (but) the fact that people are re-engaging in the search for jobs probably points to a gain in perceived opportunities, when taken with the other available indicators."

Jobs were up from April in warm weather seasonal industry sectors such as construction, Hodek said, but were also up significantly from May 2012 despite a colder and rainier than average spring. Construction added 900 jobs over the year, and leisure and hospitality added 600.

The city of Eau Claire's jobless rate was flat compared with May 2012 at 6.1 percent. It was 6.3 percent in April.

Other developments highlighted in DWD's jobs release included:

■ Unemployment rates decreased in all 12 metro areas in the state compared with April and either improved

Employers examine impact of health care reform

Affordable Care Act requires some businesses to provide health coverage

There is no shortage of acronyms involved in the implementation of the federal Affordable Care Act.

The IRS (Internal

Revenue Service), DOL (Department of Labor), HHS (Department of Health and Human Services) and a host of other agencies are scrambling to issue rules regarding health care reform, according to a presentation Tuesday by Stephen Weld,

"Whatever your political perspective is," Weld said during the Eau Claire Area

Chamber of Commerce program on ACA, "we are in changing times." Among the act's provisions is a requirement

more full-time-equivalent employees provide health coverage beginning next year. Noncompliance penalties vary slightly, but the basic fine is \$2,000 for each full-time worker beyond the first 30 employees. Thus, if a business has 65 employees and does not provide coverage, the penalty would be \$70,000. An employee's premium contribution also cannot exceed 9.5 percent of his or her household income.

There are exceptions for to purchase coverage seasonal employees in sectors such as agriculture, retail and tourism, Weld said, but companies trying to keep their staffs below the "50" threshold through independent contractors, subcontracting or staffing agencies may not escape

through an exchange called the Marketplace. The Small Business Health Options Program, or SHOP, will provide employers with resources to contain their costs and simplify the process.

Initially the open enrollment program will begin Oct. 1 and end March 31. In future years, it will begin on the same start date and end Dec. 7.

Decisions by Gov. Scott Walker's administration to not have Wisconsin set up the exchanges and to deny increased Medicaid coverage will increase costs in the state, said Mary Ellen Schill, a Ruder Ware attorney who also presented at the program.
